## **LEPTOSPIROSIS: SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS**

Leptospirosis is spread by bacteria and, once diagnosed early, it can be treated. It is spread through the urine of infected animals (usually rodents, dogs, farm animals and horses). The risk of this infectious disease is especially high in flood situations, such as after a hurricane or heavy seasonal rains. Signs and symptoms are:

### High Fever, Headache, Muscle Aches, Vomiting, Jaudice (yellow skin and eyes), Red eyes, Diarrhea, Rash

The Ministry of Health has warned that "many of these symptoms can be mistaken for other diseases. In addition, some may have no symptoms at all. The time between a person's exposure to a contaminated source and becoming sick in two days to four weeks. Illness usually begins abruptly with fever and other symptoms".

To reduce the risk of Leptospirosis, persons are advised to:

- Avoid contact with animal urine, especially if you have cuts or abrasions of the skin.
- Avoid contact with potentially contaminated water (e.g. streams, rivers and ponds)
- If working in a reas that may be prone to contamination, wear protective clothing such as boots, aprons, eye protection, or face masks.
- Consume only clean drinking water
- Inspect food carefully



## FOOD SAFETY: AFTER A FLOOD

During and after a flood, waters may carry silt, raw sewage and other bacteria that can contaminate food and make it unsafe. Therefore, it is important to take precautions to ensure that food is safe to consume. Here are some tips you can follow:

- **Inspect food** carefully to determine if it may have come into contact with flood water.
- Discard open containers, packages and foods contained in bags, paper, cloth, fiber or cardboard boxes
- Throw away fresh fruits, vegetables, fish and meat that may have come into contact with flood waters.
- Canned food items should be safe for consumption but persons are advised to remove labels and disinfect cans thoroughly with a bleach solution before opening.

## WATER SAFETY ADVISORY

During a flood, water for household use may become contaminated with bacteria, viruses and other organisms that can spread diseases and make you and your family very sick. This applies to treated and untreated water sources (streams, springs, wells). Take precautions to ensure that water is safe to consume.

- Boil or drink water that may have come into contact with flood waters. Bring the water to a complete rolling boil and then leave it to boil for an extra five minutes OR
- Purify water by treating it with regular household bleach. If water is untreated allow it to settle to remove sediment. Add bleach according to the volume of water being treated (one teaspoon of bleach to one gallon of water). Mix the bleach into the water well and cover and let stand for 30 minutes before using.

If you believe that you may have Leptospirosis please visit your nearest health facility immediately.

### **GET YOUR FLU SHOT TODAY!**

The Ministry of Health has once again embarked on an extensive campaign to encourage persons to get their flu shots at various health facilities across Trinidad and Tobago.

At the ERHA, the nursing staff has been reaching out to the public by offering influenza vaccines and sensitizing persons on the H1N1 virus. Vaccines are

The flu vaccine provides:

- Protection against the flu virus and serious complications like pneumonia
- · Reduction in the severity of flu symptoms, if they do occur
- Protection against the flu for pregnant women during and after pregnancy
- Reduction in the risk of flu-like illness in babies after birth, when mothers receive the vaccine during pregnancy
- Reduction in the risk of deaths in children from the flu
- Reduction in absenteeism from work and school

Children aged 6 months to 5 years, pregnant women, adults over 65, people with chronic medical conditions and persons with chronic respiratory illnesses are particularly susceptible to the flu and the associated complications and are therefore encouraged to get the New 2018 Flu Vaccine.

### HAND, FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

Hand, foot and mouth disease, or HFMD, is caused by a virus. Anyone can get the disease, but children under age 10 are more likely to catch it than adults.

The symptoms of HFMD are fever, painful sores in the mouth and rashes with blisters on hands, feet and buttocks

It is important to note that while HFMD is contagious, the symptoms usually resolve on their own within 1 to 2 weeks and are generally mild to moderate in intensity. Simple personal hygienic measures can reduce the risk of infection. Members of the public are therefore encouraged to:

- Wash hands frequently and thoroughly, especially after changing diapers and after using the toilet
- Clean dirty surfaces and soiled items, including toys, first with soap and water and then disinfect them with a solution of chlorine bleach (made by adding 1 tablespoon of bleach to 4 cups of water)
- Avoiding close contact with persons with HFMD (e.g. kissing, hugging, sharing eating utensils/ cups, etc.)
- Keep sick infants and children away from kindergarten, school or gatherings until they are well
- Cover your mouth and nose when sneezing and coughing
- Dispose properly of used tissues and nappies into waste bins that close securely
- Ensure the cleanliness of homes, child care centres, kindergartens and/or schools.

The Ministry of Health advises that there is no outbreak of hand, foot and mouth disease at this time. However, please continue to take preventative measures. If you or your family members present with the symptoms of HFMD, please stay away from home or school, as applicable, and visit your doctor or nearest health facility.
